As you may know, the district received its annual school report card in September for the 2023-2024 school year. Overall, Fort Recovery Local Schools received 5 stars which is the highest possible rating! Obviously, there is a lot more going on in schools than can be boiled down into one single report card, but there is some important information that can be viewed on these annual documents. There are five overall components that districts are rated on that make up the overall score. Below is a brief, general summary of what each component includes, as well as Fort Recovery Local Schools rating on each area:

- Achievement is a combined measure of how our students performed overall on the state assessments. This is called a performance index rating. This year, our school was ranked 42 out of 800+ school districts in Ohio. To give you some perspective, we were ranked 101 in 2018.
- Progress looks at how much growth students are making based on their past performance. A three-star rating signifies that students met growth expectations set by the state.
- Gap Closing measures the improvement of students in certain subgroups such as those with disabilities, identified as gifted students, or economically disadvantaged students.
- **Graduation** is a combined measure of students graduating within four or five years of entering high school. State law does allow a student's education to continue until age 22 under certain circumstances and these situations can factor into this overall score.
- Early Literacy measures reading improvement and proficiency for students in grades K-3.
- College, Career, Workforce, and Military Readiness is not an official measure yet, but is tentatively coming in the fall of 2025 following the conclusion of this school year. It will measure a students "readiness" for post-high school employment or education through FORT RECOVERY LOCAL SCHOOLS

a variety of factors. Overall, Fort Recovery Local Schools is a high-performing school in the state of Ohio and that is truly a testament to our staff, students, and community. Regardless of our report card, we are

always working to improve and continually provide the best, most fiscally responsible education we can for our students both inside and outside of the classroom. You can view our report card and look-up additional information at the following website - https://

October 21-25 is National School Bus Safety Week Stop for School Buses

When you see a school bus slowing down or stopping, it's not just the bus that you need to have your eyes on – but the surrounding area, too. Children wait at least several feet away from a bus and often cross the street when they're boarding or getting off the bus. This is why you must stop for school buses, and not attempt to pass.

Illegal School Bus Passing

Illegal school bus passing poses a significant threat to children and others on the road. In every state, it is illegal for you to pass a school bus while the stop-arm is extended and the red lights are flashing.

Understanding School Bus Lights

Learn the school bus laws and always follow them, as well as the flashing lights that school bus drivers use to alert you.

- Yellow flashing lights indicate the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. You should slow down and prepare to stop your vehicle.
- Red flashing lights and extended stop arms indicate the bus has stopped and children are getting on or off. You must stop your car and wait until the red lights stop flashing, the extended stop-arm is withdrawn, and the bus begins moving, before you can start driving again.

Bus Stop Safety

Parents, it's important to talk to your child, or children about bus stop safety. Here are some tips.

Before the Bus Arrives

Your child should arrive at the bus stop at least five minutes before the bus arrives. Ahead of the new school year, visit the bus stop and show your child where to wait for the bus, at least ten feet — five giant steps — away from the curb. Remind your child that the bus stop is not a place to run or play.

Getting On and Off Safely

When the school bus arrives, your child should wait until the bus comes to a complete stop, the door opens, and the driver says it's okay to get on or off. Your child should use the handrails to avoid falling.

Always Use Caution Around the Bus

Your child should never walk behind a school bus. If your child must cross the street in front of the bus, tell them to walk on a sidewalk or along the side of the street to a place at least ten feet — five giant steps — in front of the bus before crossing. Your child should also make eye contact with the bus driver



before crossing to make sure the driver can see that they're crossing to avoid the danger zone. If your child drops something near the school bus, like a phone or book, the safest thing is for your child to tell the bus driver right away. Your child should not try to pick up the item, because the driver might not be able to see them.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

One of the key components of the curriculum at Fort Recovery High School is to prepare students for whichever career path they choose post-graduation. While the curriculums of our core classes certainly help students gain the knowledge to be successful in their future careers, there are many other programs built into our schedule and classes that allow for this to happen. A few of these include:

- Career Explorations Class All students at FRHS are required to take Career Explorations in order to graduate. Most students take this class as a Junior. In this class, students are exposed to a variety of careers, while learning about their own interests and aptitudes. The students also receive instruction on the 14 Professional Skills deemed important to succeed in the workplace. These include Reliability, Work Ethic, Punctuality, Discipline, Teamwork/Collaboration, Professionalism, Learning Agility, Critical Thinking/Problem Solving, Leadership, Creativity/Innovation, Oral and Written Communications, Digital Technology, Global/Intercultural Fluency, and Career Management. Upon instruction of these skills, students are then tasked with earning their OhioMeansJobs(OMJ)-Readiness Seal by having three different experienced and trusted mentors validate their demonstration of these skills in school, work, or the community. Students who earn this certificate will have a valuable resource to include on their resumés that will verify to employers that the applicant demonstrates these professional skills.
- Personal Finance Class All students at FRHS are required to take Personal Finance in order to graduate. Most students take this class as a Junior. This course helps students evaluate resources, financial institutions, and services that meet individual and family goals; weigh the costs of college vs. workforce; protect financial health including credit and debit cards; practice smart investing strategies; and learn other general financial strategies.
- College Visits/Job Shadowing All students, at FRHS, are encouraged to take college visits and job shadow
 throughout the school year. Each student may have up to three college visit days and two job shadow days off of
 school per year. Utilizing these days effectively will allow students to experience jobs or colleges first hand in order to
 assist them in their future decision making.
- Career Lunch & Learns New this year to the high school are Career Lunch & Learns. During these Lunch & Learns, local business and industry representatives give up to an hour-long presentation during the students' lunch on career opportunities in their particular career field. Presentations thus far have included Mercer Health, Kaup Pharmacy, Precision Strip, and Columbus Fire/EMT. These Lunch & Learns are open to all students in the high school and serve as a valuable resource for learning about career opportunities. If you are interested in presenting at one of these Lunch & Learns throughout the school year, please contact Brian Reichert at 419-375-4111 or reichertb@fortrecoveryschools.org. We are continually looking for presentations from a variety of career fields to expose students to different types of careers available around and outside of our community.
- Industry Recognized Credentials Students at FRHS have the opportunity to earn valuable licensures, certifications, or credentials at no cost to them throughout high school. Current credentials available this school year include Sports Officiating, Retail Industry Fundamentals, Customer Service & Sales, Grain Commodity Testing, and Part 107 Drone Piloting License, with the possibility of more being added. FRHS will continue to expand upon these offerings in future years as more of these credentials become embedded into our class curriculums. Providing students opportunities to earn valuable certificates as a part of their high school curriculum will benefit the students as they apply for colleges or jobs after graduation.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

It's hard to believe, but the fall sports season will be winding down here soon. I first want to send a shout-out to our Middle School Cheerleading, Cross Country, Volleyball, and Football teams and coaches on great seasons so far.

One of the goals at our school is to equip young people for all the realities of today's world. With that in mind, we have partnered with CharacterStrong – an organization that provides training for educators and curricula for students. Their work in grades 6-12 focus on 3 main outcomes: increasing a sense of belonging for all students, improving skills that support student well-being, and deepening student engagement in their academics, in their school, and in their community. Here's what the data tells us:

Here's what the data tells us:

- A sense of belonging in school is one of the most important conditions for learning and a fundamental support for social and emotional well-being. Nearly ½ of all students report a weak sense of belonging in their schools.
 Roughly half of 6th 12th grade students say they don't enjoy coming to school most of the time.
- Mental health challenges for teens have been increasing and 7 out of 10 teens in the U.S. (between 13 and 17 years old) have named anxiety or depression as a major problem among their peers.
- Student engagement drives learning and supports school success.
- This curriculum was created to support school communities as they engage in the work of preparing young people to thrive in the 21st century. The research supports the effectiveness of this content to increase student's academic success and college & career readiness. The lessons focus on developing skills and mindsets around building positive habits, understanding our emotions, improving teamwork, and increasing empathy. We will be using this during our Tribe Days throughout the course of the year!

We want to take a moment to express our gratitude to a couple of local organizations that have become a cherished part of our school community. For the past 10 years, the Mary Help of Christians Ladies Sodality Sewing Group has provided free t-shirts to our new students, helping to foster a sense of belonging and school spirit from day one.

These t-shirts, designed and made by Be You Boutique, not only serve as a warm welcome to our newcomers but also symbolize our inclusive environment. Each year, we see students proudly wearing their shirts, which sparks a shared identity among peers.

We are incredibly thankful to these organizations for their ongoing support and commitment to our students. As we celebrate this milestone, we look forward to continuing these partnerships for many more years to come. Thank you!

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

-Required Notification-**GENERAL MONITORING OF** SCHOOL-ISSUED DEVICES

In accordance with recent legislation in Ohio, please be aware that the school district, either directly or through a technology provider, is electing to generally monitor all school-issued devices as defined by R.C. 3319.325. The monitoring will include the following features: location tracking and student interactions with school-issued devices (e.g., keystrokes and web-browsing activity). The district generally monitors these features for the noncommercial education purpose of instruction, technical support, and/or exam proctoring. Additionally, these features are generally monitored as a necessary precaution for preventing and/or responding to threats to life or safety. These precautions are not necessarily new to our district as components have been part of our district policy and acceptable use guidelines for many years. However, recent legislation changes have required additional notification and more stringent measures to safeguard student privacy. The district will continue working to comply with these legislative changes while maintaining the safety and security of our students. 
